Why this matters

In Niagara, households earn just 53% of the income needed to afford a home. That means many young professionals, families, workers and seniors are struggling to find a place to live in the communities they know and love.

What mixed housing means in Niagara

Mixed housing means creating a wider range of homes so more people can find a place that fits their needs, budget and stage of life.

It is not one type of housing. It is a mix of homes that supports different incomes, household sizes and life stages.

This can include:

- Rental and ownership options
- Smaller homes and family-sized homes
- Low-rise and mid-rise buildings
- Secondary suites and other flexible housing types
- Downsizing options for seniors

Why more housing choice matters

- Workers live closer to jobs and services
- Families find homes that fit their needs and budget
- Young professionals stay locally
- Seniors downsize close to loved ones
- Communities grow in a balanced way

The housing gap in Niagara

- Average household income in Niagara Region: **\$106,000**
- Median household income in the St. Catharines–Niagara Census Metropolitan Area: **\$74,750**
- Household income per person/per capita: **\$51,688**
- Income needed to afford an average home: **\$200,000**
